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Maths

- **Number and Place Value:** Pupils read, write, compare and round numbers up to 10 million, including using negative numbers in context.
- **Addition, Subtraction, Multiplication and Division:** Pupils solve multi-step problems using mental and written methods, including understanding factors, multiples and the order of operations.
- **Fractions, Decimals and Percentages:** Pupils calculate with fractions, decimals and percentages, including conversions, and solve problems involving ratio and proportion.
- **Algebra:** Pupils use simple formulae, generate sequences and solve equations with unknowns in real-world contexts.
- **Measurement:** Pupils convert between units, solve problems involving perimeter, area and volume, and use formulas accurately.
- **Geometry – Properties of Shape:** Pupils draw, classify and measure angles in 2D and 3D shapes and find missing angles in known shapes.
- **Geometry – Position and Direction:** Pupils plot, translate and reflect shapes on all four quadrants of the coordinate plane.
- **Statistics:** Pupils interpret and construct pie charts and line graphs, and calculate the mean as an average.

Autumn Term Home Learning – World War II

Between now and the end of the Autumn Term (Christmas), we expect children to complete at least one of these activities each week. There are 20 options and we expect **14** to be completed.

Make a WWII recipe using WWII rations

Design, make and decorate a WWII style paper airplane (will it fly?)

Write a WWII message using Morse code

Research the life of a Anne Frank. What rights do you have today that she did not?

Get ideas from the speeches of Winston Churchill and write a speech to rally the nation or celebrate victory

Create a presentation on the D-Day landings

Imagine you are a WWII soldier, sailor or pilot and write a poem about your experiences

Create a piece of Art depicting Operation Dynamo

Research British currency in WWII and compare it to British currency today

Design (and possibly make) a periscope which could be used during combat in WWII. Must be an improvement on the ones made in class.

Research your family Tree and relatives that lived during WWII.

Read WWII texts such as: Goodnight Mister Tom, Adolphus Tips, The Elephant in the Garden, Carrie's War or one you know of or find yourself

Create a timeline of events that occurred in World War 2.

Imagine you are an evacuee. Write a postcard home explaining what has happened to you.

Research what the blackout was and the effect it had on people? What would you have invented to combat this problem?

Visit and write about a WWII site of interest

Design and carry an experiment on which shapes parachute would work best. Remember to obey fair scientific test rules.

Research what school life was like for children who were living during WWII.

Write instructions or advice during an air raid.

Make do and Mend! Can you use something old to create something new.

Learning with Parents

Expectations: Reading 3x per week recording on LwP (a digital log)

SATS

- In 2026, Year 6 pupils will sit SATs tests in **Reading, Maths** (arithmetic and reasoning), and **Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling (GPS)**.
- The **Maths tests** include three papers: one arithmetic (30 minutes) and two reasoning papers (40 minutes each), covering number, fractions, algebra, geometry, measurement and statistics.
- The **Reading test** is a single 60-minute paper with questions based on three texts, assessing comprehension, vocabulary and inference.
- The **GPS test** consists of a 45-minute grammar and punctuation paper and a 20-word spelling test.
- All tests are externally marked, and results are reported using **scaled scores**, with 100 being the expected standard.
